attention of school age children. Through the education of our younger

audience, we will be able to promote an awareness of the fragile nature of archaeological sites and the need for protection for future generations to enjoy. The events held during Oregon Archaeology Celebration provide learning experiences for everyone – children, young adults and for those who really are young at heart.

We hope that you will join us in participating in the many events that

are offered this year. Please remember that archaeological sites are an important part of our heritage and they are fragile. If you visit an archaeological or historical site, please treat the site with respect so that others may enjoy it as well. State and federal laws prohibit site damage or the removal of artifacts from sites.



The Oregon Archaeology Celebration poster uses motifs loosely based upon authentic motifs found in Oregon. Many Native American tribes made rock art during religious ceremonies or spirit quests. Pictograph and pictograph sites are places of power that provide a window into their beliefs.

If you are visiting a pictograph or petroglyph site, please help us protect these sites by following a few guidelines.

- Please Don't Touch. Body oils from your hands contribute to the destruction of the art.
- Keep Dust and Smoke Away. Dust and smoke build up on the rock and obscure the drawings.
- Please do not make rubbings or chalk in the outlines of petroglyphs you find in the field. This can damage the glyph.
- Please do take photos or sketch the motif in a sketch book or tablet.
- Keep the Site Intact. Disturbing, defacing, or looting an archaeological site is against the law. These activities destroy Oregon's cultural heritage.


